Philippians 4:8

"Positive Preaching"

Have you ever replaced the batteries in a flashlight, then flipped the switch on to find that it still doesn't work? Upon further examination you discover that you have placed the batteries in the wrong way (backwards). The positive pole of the battery is where the negative pole ought to be and a correction of your error is necessary before the flashlight will work.

Some brethren have their spiritual batteries in backwards, as far as God's word is concerned. They have swapped the poles around, or you might say, "they have their wires crossed." Some have even let their batteries run completely down and die! It is now common to hear "positive" brethren cry for more "positive preaching" to the exclusion of mentioning anything they consider as being negative; their desire being to have their ears tickled (2 Tim. 4:1-4). Question: Have you ever tried to run something that is powered by a battery by only connecting the positive end of the battery? If you disconnect the negative lead from your battery terminal on your automobile, would it start? Both terminals must be correctly connected for proper operation!

Isaiah spoke of those who swapped things around and he pronounced a "woe" when he said, "Woe unto them that call evil good, and good evil; that put darkness for light, and light for darkness; that put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter" (Isa. 5:20). The prophet also described this attitude in Isaiah 30:10 where he wrote, "Which say to the seers, See not; and to the prophets, Prophesy not unto us right things, speak unto us smooth things, prophesy deceits." Brethren who engage in such a practice, fellowship darkness and "do not the truth," while professing to be walking "in the light" (1 Jn. 1:5-7).

Gospel preachers who boldly preach and proclaim "all the council of God" (Acts 20:27) and "earnestly contend for the faith" (Jude 3) are often criticized for being "too negative, too boring, too judgmental, legalistic, watch dog brethren." Their critics demand preaching that "accentuates the positive and eliminates the negative" and they often demonstrate a great distaste for lessons which "reprove" (negative), "rebuke" (negative), "and exhort" (positive) "with all longsuffering and doctrine" (2 Tim. 4:2-4).

To coin a phrase similar to the Yellow Page advertising phrase, "Let your fingers do the walking...," we will let God's Word do the talking! Please open your Bible and consider just a few of the many "positive" texts of God's Word, since there is such as desire for "positive preaching":

Ezekiel 33:7-9: "So thou, O son of man, I have set thee a watchman unto the house of Israel; therefore thou shalt hear the word at my mouth, and warn them from me. When I say unto the wicked, O wicked man, thou shalt surely die; if thou dost not speak to warn the wicked from his way, that wicked man shall die in his iniquity; but his blood will I require at thine hand. Nevertheless, if thou warn the wicked of his way to turn from it; if he do not turn from his way, he shall die in his iniquity; but thou hast delivered thy soul."

<u>1 Peter 1:13-16</u>: "Wherefore gird up the loins of your mind, be sober, and hope to the end for the grace that is to be brought unto you at the revelation of Jesus Christ; As obedient children, not fashioning yourselves according to the former lusts in your ignorance: But as he which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation; Because it is written, Be ye holy; for I am holy."

Colossians 3:1-2, 5-7: "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth....Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence, and covetousness, which is idolatry. For which things' sake the wrath of God cometh on the

children of disobedience: In the which ye also walked some time, when ye lived in them."

Space limitations do not allow the text of other passages to be quoted at this time, but, please take your Bible and read these passages which can be considered as "positive" texts: Matthew 5:32; 16:18;19:9; 28:19-20; Romans 16:17; 1 Corinthians 6:18-20; Ephesians 5:22-25; 1 Thessalonians 5:21-22; 1 Timothy 6:12; 2 Timothy 2:15, 19; 3:12; Titus 2:11-15; Hebrews 5:8-9; James 1:22-25; James 4:7-10; 1 Peter 3:21; 1 John 2:3.

There has been and will continue to be excellent sermons preached by sound gospel preachers using these and other "positive" passages for their sermon text. As we have already noted, these passages are but a few of the many "positive" texts of the Bible.

Will brethren who desire "positive preaching" tolerate lessons based on the truths of these texts? Or, will they seek to have their ears tickled and turn away from the truth unto fables (2 Tim. 4:3-4)? Will "positive" brethren heed the admonition given by Jeremiah who plead, "Thus saith the LORD, Stand ye in the ways, and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls"? Or, will they make the same reply that Jeremiah heard, by saying, "We will not walk therein" (Jer. 6:16)? Let us place our trust in "all the counsel of God" (Acts 20:27) and remember the proclamation of Jesus who said, "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth" (Jn. 17:17). Only the pure and simple gospel of Christ will positively save man from the guilt of sin. There is no substitute! – tgmc ■
